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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

Compton Water Association Compton, Arkansas

I have performed the procedures listed below with respect to the financial information and state law compliance which are agreed to by the management of Compton Water Association for the period January 1, 2023 – December 31, 2023. Management is responsible for maintaining the financial records and complying with the state law. An agreed upon procedures engagement involves performing specific procedures that the Compton Water Association has agreed to and acknowledged to be appropriate for the intended purposed of the engagement and reporting on findings based on the procedures performed below. This report is prepared in accordance with Ark. Code Ann. 14-234-119. This engagement to perform agreed-upon procedures was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the Compton Water Association. Consequently, I make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The Compton Water Association has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate to meet the intended purpose of complying with Arkansas Code §14-234-119 and the Guidelines for Conducting Agreed-upon Procedures for Water and Sewer Providers dated August 2, 2021, as published by the Arkansas Legislative Joint Auditing Committee. This report may not be suitable for any other purpose. The procedures performed may not address all the items of interest to a user of this report and may not meet the needs of all users of this report and, as such, users are responsible for determining whether the procedures performed are appropriate for their purpose. The procedures and the associated findings are as follows:

1. Cash and Investments

- A Prepare a proof of cash for the year and reconcile year-end bank balances to book balance.
- B. Confirm with depository institutions the cash on deposit and investments.
- C. Agree the proof of cash ending balances to the book balances within 5% or \$500, whichever is greater.

Findings:

None

2. Receipts

- A Agree the deposits per the proof of cash for the year with the deposits per the journal within 5% or \$500, whichever is greater.
- B. Agree 10 customer payments on the accounts receivable subledger to deposit and billing documents.
- C. For ten deposits, agree the cash/check composition of the deposit with receipt information.

Findings: The Association did not provide copies of deposit slips, so I was not able to determine if cash payments were accepted so it was not possible to determine the composition of the deposit.

Recommendation:

If the Association does accept cash payments, I recommend they prepare a cash receipt for the acceptance of cash. I also recommend they keep copies of all deposits made.

3. Accounts Receivable:

- A Agree 10 customer billings to the accounts receivable subledger.
- B. Determine that five (5) customer adjustments are properly authorized.

Findings: None

4. Disbursements:

- A Agree the disbursements per the proof of cash for the year with the disbursements per the journal within 5% or \$500, whichever is greater.
- Analyze all property, plant, and equipment disbursements if applicable.
- C. Select all disbursements other than payroll paid to the employees and 10 other disbursements and determine if they are adequately documented.

Findings: None

5. Property, Plant and Equipment - Determine that additions and disposals are properly accounted for in the records. (Materiality level - 5% of total equipment or \$500, whichever is greater.)

Findings: None

Long-Term Debt:

- A Schedule long-term debt and verify changes in all balances for the year.
- B. Confirm loans, bonds, notes, and contracts payable with lender/trustee/contractor.
- C. Determine that the appropriate debt service accounts have been established and maintained.

Findings: The Association does maintain a debt service reserve account, but the balance in the account is not sufficient to meet the monthly loan requirement by USDA and Arkansas Department of Agriculture – Natural Resources Division.

Recommendations: I recommend the Compton Water Association maintain debt service accounts with amounts necessary to meet USDA and Department of Agriculture debt service reserve requirements.

7. General

Determine that any items of significance were approved and documented in the minutes of the governing body's meeting.

8. Other

Compton Water Association has been having cash flow issues since 2020. The revenue is not enough to support the expenses related to the water system. As a result, the office manager transferred money from the Meter Reserve bank account to the Operating Account to cover monthly expenses. A liability has been created to show the balance owed to the Meter Reserve Fund.

Compton Water Association purchases water from Southwest Boone Water. Due to cash flow issues, the Association has not paid the total owed each month to Southwest Boone Water. The Association owed \$61,829 on December 31, 2023, and this amount is shown as a payable in the financial statements.

I am not engaged to, and did not conduct an examination or review, the objective of which would be the expression of an opinion on the Compton Water Association's financial statements or specified elements, accounts, or items thereof.

Accordingly, I do not express such an opinion. Had I performed additional procedures, other matters might have come to my attention that would have been reported to you. I am required to be independent of the Compton Water Association and to meet other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to the agreed-upon procedures engagement.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Compton Water Association and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than this specified party.
